Work from home - Year 1

Suggested daily timetable

	Morning Start your morning with a workout (Joe Wicks, Just Dance, BBC movers)		Afternoon Begin your afternoon session with some handwriting or fine motor development e.g. playdough or threading.	
Mon	Phonics	Maths	History	Have a look at the pictures below of the seaside over time or use the internet to research together and find your own. Is there anything that is the same or different? How many comparisons can you make?
Tue	Phonics	English	PE	Practise throwing a ball at a target, you could use a tub in the garden or you might have a hula hoop you could hang from somewhere. Practise your aim throwing underarm and overarm, which way is the easiest? Make it into a competition, how many tries did you have before you got it in? You could make your target smaller to make it harder!
Wed	Phonics	Maths	Science	How are your seeds doing? Have you seen any changes? Make sure to record your observations in your plant diary.
Thurs	Phonics	English	Art	As we have been thinking about the coast, I would like you to think about the wildlife you may see at the seaside, in or out of the water. Use some junk modelling material from your house to make an animal you might see at the seaside.
Fri	Phonics	Maths	History	As we celebrate VE day today, I thought it would be nice for the children to learn a little more about it and why the celebration this year is significant. I have attached an information sheet below for you to read together. You could follow up by having your own VE day party, decorate your house with red, blue and white. Have a go at making some union jack flags together.

Suggested activities

Phonics:

Log in to Phonics Play - **username** march 20 **password** home – access some of the games.

Phonics lessons at school last for approx. 20 minutes.

- Use Phonics Play to play some of the games.
- On <http://phonicsplaycomics.co.uk/comics.html> you can find comic strips that are completely decodable. The children can practise their reading with these.
- Together practise reading the /ee/ sound as it is made in words with these four spellings, ee, y, e and ea. See word list for words to read. To help the children, before reading each word add sound buttons and find the /ee/ sound together.

- After you have read the words on the word list a few times over a few days, now have a go at the sorting activity below. To do this, the children must read each word, identify the spelling of the /ee/ sound and write the word in the correct list. Remember to cross out the word after you have added it to the list so you know which ones you have done!

Maths

White Rose Maths have made some fantastic short videos to support the children's Maths learning during this time.

This week I would like the children to watch and work through Summer Term - Week 2.

This includes:

- Lesson One – Find a half (2)
- Lesson Two – Find a quarter (1)
- Lesson Three – Find a quarter (2)

I have intentionally not included Lesson 4 as there is some learning we have not done yet included in the questions.

I hope you find these videos helpful and enjoy having the pressure taken off you for a little while! During the video please be on hand to help your child through the questions and there will be times the videos ask you to pause to answer a question together.

Following these video lessons there are so many opportunities to consolidate the learning in and around your home.

- Make shapes and cut them into halves and quarters.
- Use your playdough to make shapes and cut them into halves and quarters.
- Sort toys/objects into 2 or 4 equal groups.
- Give the children a quantity of objects and ask for half/quarter.
- Swap around so the children ask you for a half/quarter. Make a mistake, can they spot it and explain what has gone wrong?
- Do some baking and cut your creation into halves and quarters.
- When cutting up food at tea time talk about equal and unequal parts.

English

- Make a fact file about something/someone of your choice. It could be a superhero, minibeast, fictional character or a key worker! First, do some research on your chosen subject. The fact file should include a title, a picture and 3 more informative sections. A few ideas for what these sections could be about include appearance, habitat, place of work, what they do or their likes and dislikes. This doesn't have to be done all in one go, you could do a section a day.
- As promised last week another short text for the children to read, I hope you enjoyed last week's and had some good discussion around the questions afterwards. Enjoy the next one!

Dear Fay,

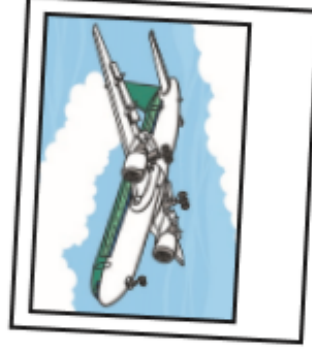


There was such a big delay when I went on holiday to Norway. My ticket was for Saturday but I had to wait until Sunday.

Victory in Europe Day

What Is VE Day?

- VE Day is a day to remember the end of the Second World War.
- It is a day to remember the bravery of those who lived during the war.
- It is a day to remember the soldiers who were in the war.

Time to Celebrate

- VE Day is always on May 8th.
- On May 7th 1945, Germany **surrendered** the war.
- People **celebrated** with street parties.
- People wore red, white and blue – the colours of the British flag.
- People waved flags.
