Write a book review of the novel Private Peaceful by Michael Morpurgo. Share your views with others in your family.	Talk to your family and find out if any members of your family lived through WW1 and what happened.	Help a sibling with their homework. Your own idea! Be as creative as you want.	Create a character profile of a soldier in the war. Maybe you could use the name of someone from the local area and imagine what their life may have been like.
