The 3 Little Pigs Week 5 – Writing to Persuade

Learning and tasks

Session 1: Feature Spotting

This week, we are writing to persuade – something we have done a lot over the course of KS2. This video may help you to remember what this means, if you cannot remember fully. <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=hD9arWXiddM>

Read the Model Text – a persuasive text. Then, read it back through again and find some examples of each feature on the Feature Spotting Sheet. Write 2 examples of each feature in the boxes beside the features.

Session 2: The 3 Little Pigs

Think back to your recent learning about the 3 Little Pigs. We know that the Big Bad Wolf has blown the first two houses down and then has been boiled alive by the pigs in the third (brick) house. In last week's writing, you wrote a balanced argument about whether or not the pigs should be punished. This week, you are going to create a persuasive text. You have two choices about how you would like to approach this:

- 1) Create a persuasive text from one of the pigs, trying to convince the public that he should not be punished and why.
- 2) Write a persuasive text from the wolf, trying to convince the public that the pigs should be punished and why.

Decide which option you want to write. Then, you will need to go back to your writing from last week and pick out your arguments that will back up what you are saying to the judge. Add them to your **Planning Sheet**. You also need to add some of the vocabulary that you would like to use.

Session 3: Writing

Using your plan, create your text.

Remember to

- Use the Model Text to help you.
- Use your plan to help you.
- Think about your vocabulary – the word mats included at the end of this document will help you.

Session 4: Editing

Read back over your work and edit:

- Correct and mistakes with SPaG
- Check that your writing is persuasive and meets that purpose
- Can you uplevel any vocabulary?
- Can you add any more persuasive features?

Persuasive text

Persuasive text is used by a writer to persuade others. It can also be used to criticise and review ideas and actions.

When do I use it?

To persuade by arguing a case for or against a particular point of view

Introduction

State the problem and your position on the topic.

Argument

Give the arguments for and rebut any arguments against.

Conclusion

You might restate your position in the conclusion to help the reader make up his or her mind.
